BEETHOVEN/HERMANN/PAGELS Duet in C major

This is the first of a set of three duets are thought today to have been composed by someone other than Beethoven. They have however earned a significant place in woodwind chamber music literature and are still reflected in the Beethoven catalogue. The originals were composed for clarinet and bassoon and first published in parts from 1810-15.

Today the first of the Three Duets will be performed on violin and viola. It has three movements: (1) *Allegro commodo*- the first melodic theme is introduced by the violin with the viola accompanying in moving quavers. The second theme is introduced by the viola. This movement is in sonata form: theme one, theme two, development and then recapitulation of the two main themes. Both parts are given fairly equal treatment throughout. It is a very positive, joyful movement.

- (2) Larghetto sostenuto- the slow second provides a beautiful contrast with the constantly moving energy of first movement. It is in C minor, a beautiful, almost mournful movement with divine harmonies between violin and viola.
- (3) Rondo- allegretto (vivace) in the original key of C major and a similar character to the first, the violin opens with the movements first melodic idea accompanied by the viola. The second melodic idea is then introduced by the viola, and so it goes with the melodies slightly altered and of course developed. The rhythm is also further developed with the introduction of triplet passages, alternating between the violin and viola and then in harmony. There is a brief shift to C Minor prior to its jubilant finale in its original key of C Major.
